

Breakthroughs in Pediatric Research:

How You Help Advance Sickle Cell Disease Care

ickle cell disease (SCD) is a painful genetic condition that affects millions of people around the world, and about 100.000 children and adults in the United States. But much is unknown about how this illness wreaks havoc in the body. Many patients can be cured through a bone marrow transplant, but finding a donor match is rare, even among family members.

That's why your continued support is crucial. Your generosity helps power the groundbreaking research that leads to new breakthroughs, like the work physician-researchers Cheryl A. Hillery, MD, professor of pediatrics at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine, and Deirdre Nolfi-Donegan, MD, are doing.

With Dr. Hillery's mentorship, Dr. Nolfi-Donegan is studying the differences between SCD blood clotting and healthy blood clotting in hopes of developing and improving therapeutic

strategies available to patients with SCD.

There's still a lot of work to do, but Dr. Hillery and Dr. Nolfi-Donegan are hoping that further research will prompt a better understanding of how to treat this disease. Soon, they hope to provide improved therapies, targeted medications, and longer lifespans for patients with SCD.
