Gage thanks you for helping him fight for his life

wo-year-old Gage uses his very own sign language. When he sees his mom or grandma, he clasps his hand under his cheek and gazes at them with big, dreamy eyes. It's his way of saying, "I love you."

If he met you, Gage would sign his love for you, too, because you're helping him fight for his life.

Gage is undergoing chemotherapy for a cancerous brain tumor. He's also experiencing mutism — an inability to speak.

His mom, Keli, knew something was wrong when he was having trouble staying awake. She took him to a doctor who found a tumor the size of a tennis ball in Gage's brain. He needed treatment immediately.

Gage had brain surgery at UPMC Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh. Now, Keli is hopeful that Gage will beat his illness for good with the help of chemotherapy and a stem cell transplant.

She can't wait to see him enjoy his favorite things again, like going to the playground and taking rides on a golf cart. Until then, she says, she wouldn't want him to be anywhere else.

"The staff, doctors, and nurses here are amazing," Keli says.

BREAKTHROUGH:

You Fuel Groundbreaking Research

A lifesaving link to detecting blood on the brain

ew studies may be able to help doctors identify when babies have been victims of abusive head trauma.

"Abusive head trauma (AHT), or 'shaken baby syndrome,' is the leading cause of death from traumatic brain injury in infants," says Rachel Berger, MD, MPH, Chief of the Child Advocacy Center at UPMC Children's.

Dr. Berger and her colleagues have been researching approaches to detect when infants have brain bleeding as a result of AHT. A new blood test — the first of its kind — has been developed and will hopefully be licensed for clinical use in the near future.

This blood test would identify if an infant has a high likelihood of bleeding in the brain, similar to how other blood tests can help detect

liver or kidney injury. If the brain blood test is abnormal, infants would undergo a head CT or brain MRI to confirm the bleeding, and then need an evaluation to determine the cause of that bleeding.

Approximately 30 percent of AHT diagnoses are missed because symptoms, such as vomiting or fussiness, can mimic other illness.

Missed diagnoses can lead to permanent brain damage and even death — meaning a test like this could save young lives.
